Welcome to this, the first in a new series of bulletins to be produced and published by the Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena.

As you may know, the last publication to be produced by the group was the 'Esher May Fair' edition of 'Pegasus', a journal which has been associated with the group since 1969.

In recent months, there has been a great deal of renewed interest in the subject of UFOs, and consequently we have decided that demand is sufficient for the group to become more active.

Apart from the constant trickle of local reports, we have been heavily involved in a number of other investigations, principally, the sighting of UFOs from a British Airways Trident by the pilot, his crew, and many of the passengers. This report came to our attention a year ago, and it was only fairly recently that the pilot, in an effort to establish an explanation, brought the case to public notice.

Despite the widely reported explanation that the objects seen by the pilots over Portugal were balloons, there are still a number of anomalies which we are still investigating.

STRATEGY FOR THE NEXT TEN YEARS

Ten years in ufology is a long time. In ten years, ten hypotheses can be considered and thrown out of ten different windows for ten different reasons. Out of ten 'experts', perhaps only one survives after ten years - and out of ten groups, perhaps only one survives.

One of those survivors is the Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena. The reasons for its survival are harder to ascertain than the fact of its existence. But Sigap has played a major role in both the local and national ufological scene. It has investigated local sightings with an enthusiasm undampened by the prevailing winds of public opinion and political expediency.

Much of the group's success has been due to the loyalty and strength of those who have supported the group since its inception in 1967. Under the chairmanship of one man for eight of those years, it has weathered the storms of public ridicule, and private power struggles within the existing organisations in this country.

It is inevitable that in studying a subject as elusive as ours, personalities play an important part in the organisational structure. Unfortunately, the pursuit of this charismatic form of leadership often ends suddenly, and leaves a bitter taste in ones mouth. Many of us have seen the demise of many a group because of the inflexibility of its representatives. More sadly, the cause of ufology has been advanced not one iota.

The strength of Sigap lies in its flexibility of approach. It floats with the tide and drifts with the wind. It does not commit itself to rigid policies which could later prove embarrassing. It co-operates with those who wish to co-operate. After all, its primary purpose is to investigate reports of unusual aerial phenomena - and this it has done steadfastly for over ten years. Let's hope that in ten years time, ufologists have ironed out many of their differences - differences which, if channelled in the right direction, could be utilised for the good of our cause.

UFO ACTIVITY IN THE BASINGSTOKE AREA

We have recently received a number of reports from the Basingstoke, Hants area, the latest one being from Yateley on the night of Friday 9 September. This report, of a golden disc with a flashing light, is currently being investigated by one of our local members. We hope to publish details in the next Bulletin.

Over the last few years, there has been a noticeable increase in UFO activity around the Reading/Basingstoke area. This has included a disc-shaped object hovering near a school, and an object, described as a 'half-ball bearing' shooting across the sky from east to south west. This object was traced from Andover through to Fleet on 24 May this year. One witness, a Mr Dooley, was cycling home through Fleet at 10.50 pm when he saw the object and nearly fell off his bicycle as the object zoomed overhead.

Our main interest however, has been at Basingstoke, where on the night of 27 August, Mrs Hilda Downes of Winklebury Estate saw a bright star-like object, described as being six inches in diameter, split into two. This sighting, which occurred just before 11.00 pm, astounded Mrs Downes, who had gone outside to put her milk bottles on the step.

A section "split" from the main star-like object, zoomed across the sky and disappeared in the direction of the Lancing Bagnall factory half-a-mile away. Mrs Downes described the object as at first appearing like a ball of condensed smoke, and then appearing as a large dinner plate or disc. The object's silver colour was described by Mrs Downes as being like "the wartime Barrage balloons. The event had taken place in just a few seconds from start to finish.

As this was not the first time Mrs Downes had seen something strange in the sky she was curious, and decided that this time she must do something about it. When a neighbour suggested looking in the telephone directory for a UFO investigation group, the problem was solved, an Sigap were quickly on the scene.

Mrs Downes has previously seen a bright 'star' that shone a beam of light to the ground. She described the light as being bluish-green, and was emitted from a very bright 'star' with six or seven points of light.

An interesting postscript was when Mrs Downes mentioned the sighting of a local farmer who delivers potatoes to the estate. He had told her that one night on his way home to the farm, about two miles away, his van was followed by a very bright light. This incident occurred while he was driving along what is known to be an old Roman road. We are hoping to contact this farmer, and aim to report on this investigation in the next issue of the Bulletin.

WHAT IS THE MOON?

By now we know that the moon is not just a romantic golden disc in the night sky. It would seem that the moon is not a fragment of the earth but probably came from outside the solar system.

This is the astounding theory recently produced by two Soviet scientists, Michael Vasin and Alexander Shcherbakov.

Information from the Apollo manned landings shows that the age and composition of rock samples on the moon are totally different from those on earth. THE STRANGE CASE OF THE MOTORWAY, THE WANDERER AND THE UFO

It all started at the end of June. Omar Fowler was contacted by Bufora's national co-ordinator, Ken Phillips, who in turn had heard a strange story, related to him third hand.

Apparently, at about 13.00 hours on 23 June (this time and date was confirmed later) a man was found wandering on the M3 between junctions 1 and 2 by the motorway police. He was taken to Ascot Police Station where he claimed to have met beings from an unidentified flying object.

The police, thinking he was under the influence of drugs, sent him to Heatherwood Hospital - however this test proved negative.

Following extensive enquiries, we established that in fact a man had been found on the motorway, was taken to the police station, and subsequently transferred to Heatherwood Hospital.

The 'witness' was detained at Heatherwood for one night and was then moved inexplicably to Fairmile Hospital at Wallingford in Oxfordshire. We wrote the following letter to the Medical Director of the hospital, in fact, a mental institution.

"...We have been informed that a man was apprehended by the Police after being found wandering along the M3 on 23 June last. This man claimed that he had seen a UFO and that he had met people from this craft...We are most anxious to interview this man if it is possible. We appreciate that he may be undergoing some form of treatment and that this would not be advisable.

"However, we would assume that just because someone says he saw a UFO that he would not automatically be admitted not related to the sighting of a UFO and that it would not interfere with his treatment, we wonder whether we would be able to interview him.

BASINGSTOKE FLAP CONTINUES

UFOs continue to be seen in and around Basingstoke. Interest in the area is unusually high and this has resulted in some interesting multi-witness reports.

Reasons for a flap are always difficult to determine. A common school of thought is that UFO sightings increase proportionally to the amount of publicity given to the subject. In this case, both Sigap and UFOs in general, have received more than their usual share of attention. Chairman Omar Fowler has already given two Thames Valley Radio interviews, as well as a spot on Southern News (BBC) television based at Southampton. These interviews alone have generated a number of reports - add to these, the series of UFO articles in the new 'Star' newspaper, based in the Camberley/Farnborough/Aldershot area, the number of reports increases still further.

But whatever the reasons, one fact remains. UFOs continue to be observed, by all sorts of people, in all sorts of circumstances. Publicity about UFOs, whether good or bad, nearly always unearthes a hitherto unknown report. And the more reports we have to go on, the nearer we shall surely be to establishing the nature of the phenomenon.

Reports of close encounters with UFOs, and in some cases, with their occupants, have brought fear and curiosity, conjecture and debate.

Membership brings you our newsletter, *Sigap News*, information about our free book and tape library, and details of our regular meetings held in Guildford and Ash Vale.

To investigate the UFO phenomenon locally, a small group of people got together early in 1967. The outcome – the **Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena**. Primarily founded to investigate reports in Surrey and surrounding counties, Sigap has contributed to studies in many parts of Southern England.

News of a sighting – often through the Sigap 'Hot-line' – Farnborough 41012 – triggers an instant and well-established course of action. This preliminary enquiry procedure is designed to eliminate obvious explanations. With so much going on in the sky today – much of it generated by man himself – over 80 per cent of reports can be explained in terms of natural and man-made phenomena.

If Sigap investigators find no immediate explanation as a result of preliminary enquiries, the group will send someone to interview the witnesses, and where possible, will visit the site from which the observation was made. Sigap then calls on the expertise of its own consultants in an effort to explain the sighting. The group liaises with similar organisations throughout the country, and often finds a pattern of activity consistent with that in other areas.

Our most significant reports are sent to the Center for UFO Studies in Evanston, Illinois, USA. The Center is run by Dr J Allan Hynek, Professor of Astronomy at Northwestern University, and for 20 years, was consultant to the US Air Force on UFOs.

BOYS PANIC AT SIGHT OF UFO OVER MYTCHETT

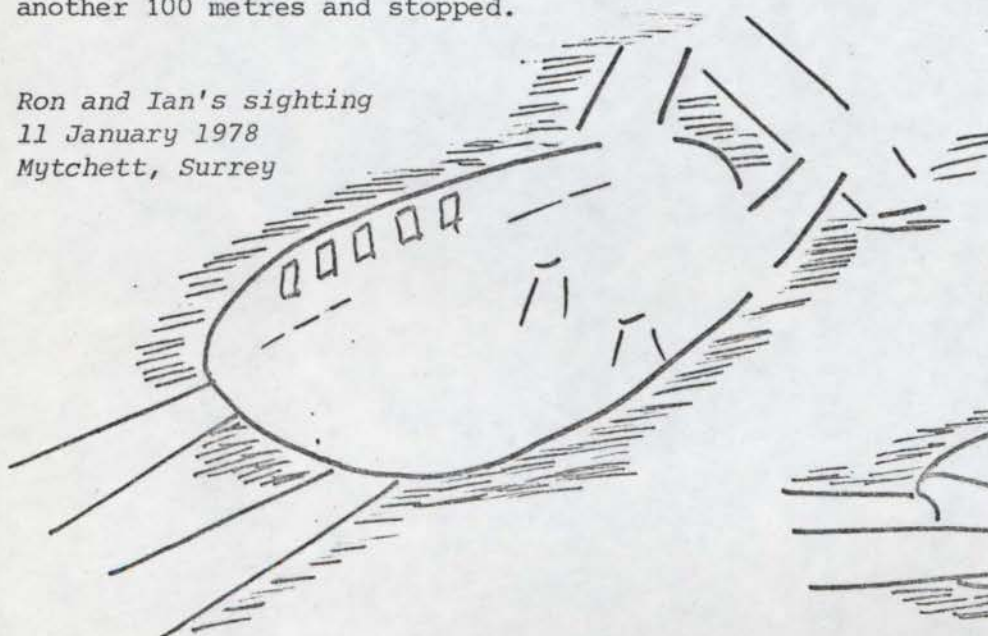
Two 15-year old Mytchett schoolboys, Ron Hills and Ian Hoole, were returning home after paying an evening visit to a local youth club. The day was Wednesday 11 January 1978, and the time, about 9.35pm. It was a blustery night, so Ron and Ian decided to run home together, "just for a bit of sport, just to keep fit".

As they ran towards the top of a nearby railway bridge along the Mytchett Road, they noticed what they described as a large object flying over them. They first thought that it was an aircraft, but noticed that it had what appeared to be two headlights which lit up the clouds ahead of it. On the underside of the object were two red lights flashing on and off alternatively.

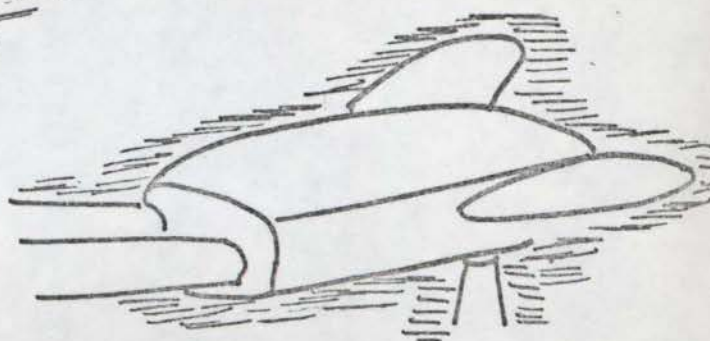
By now, the object seemed to be getting lower. They could make out a large dark shape, and could hear a faint noise. They were quite sure at this stage that the object could not be an aircraft because, as the commented later, it was by now so low, that had it been a plane, the noise would have been tremendous. As they watched, the object moved off into the distance. Both Ron and Ian were speechless, and more than a little scared. They continued home, discussing what they had seen, and within a few minutes, were approaching their homes, some half-a-mile further on.

As they walked, they caught sight of the lights in the distance, between some rooftops. The lights, they noticed, seemed to be moving from side to side. The boys stepped out into the centre of the road to get a clearer view of the object, which was now directly ahead of them. They decided to make another run for home, and as they did so, they could again hear the noise of the object. This time, it appeared to be getting louder. Catching sight of lights again, they realised that the object was getting closer... and seemingly following them. They ran about another 100 metres and stopped.

A CLASSIC PILOT SIGHTING

The following incident was related by Donald Keyhoe of the Washington-based National Investigation Committee on Aerial Phenomena to 'True Magazine', August 1950. This summary has been translated from the Danish magazine 'UFO Nyt'.

"We were flying 140 kilometres east of Chicago, when Captain Manning suddenly saw a mysterious light. It was evening - 2025 hours on 27 April 1950 - when the Transworld DC3 was flying at 600 metres over Gosham Indiana.

"On the left of the cockpit sat Captain Robin Addicks, a heavily-built man who had been with TWA for ten years. They flew a couple of minutes at 1200 metres when Captain Manning suddenly saw a peculiar red light approaching. The DC3 was flying at 280 kph but the light was with them all the time. Then it changed to orange - like a fireball. It was burning clearly on top but not at the bottom. For a moment he thought he was going mad. He had heard of UFO reports from other pilots. He turned to Captain Addicks. Addicks took the microphone and called up TWA Chicago. "We have observed a remarkable object", he radioed. The air traffic controller could not help.

"Both pilots continued to look at the object which they estimated to be 800 metres from them. They kept the aircraft on course at the same speed. Manning wanted to veer closer, but the object receded and returned on a number of occasions.

"They asked others in the aircraft to observe the phenomenon. On board were two Boeing engineers, who were described as being 'amazed'.

"The sighting was reported widely in newspapers".

RESEARCH UNCOVERS 'NEW' LIFE FORM

Biologists working for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the US National Science Foundation have identified a 'new' form of life on Earth, possibly dating back to the planet's first billion years.

The new form - previously thought to be a type of ordinary bacteria - is a METHANE-PRODUCING organism, representing a line of evolutionary descent that is totally separate from the two traditionally-recognised lines - animals and plants, and bacteria.

The organisms may be the oldest of life forms too - coming not only before plants and animals, but also before bacteria.

The finding was made by a research team headed by Dr Carl Woese, Professor of Genetics and Development at the University of Illinois, an expert on the genetic code.

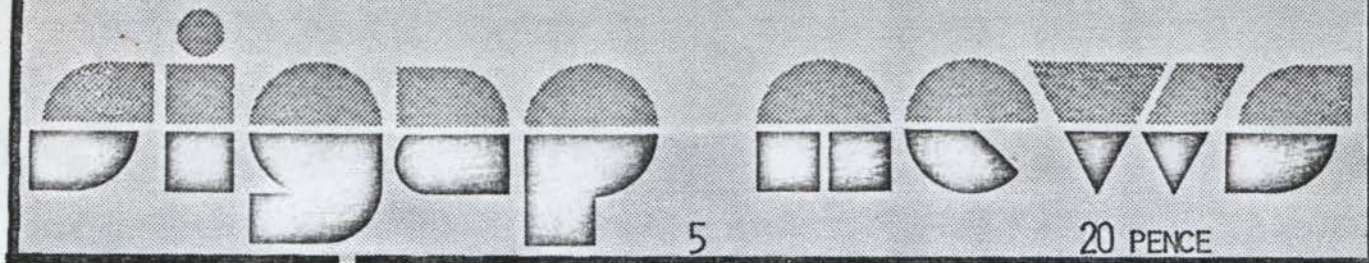
Methane-producing organisms appear to be ideally suited to what scientists believe to have been the Earth's primitive atmosphere. The organisms can:

- * Get all their food and energy from very simple compounds such as carbon dioxide and hydrogen, the main gases in a primitive atmosphere.
- * Not use any of the complex chemicals most other organisms require as food such as sugars and amino acids.
- * Grow at high temperatures (65 - 70°C).

They are now found only in niches swept clean of oxygen, such as deep in hot springs at Yellowstone.

The researchers said that the discovery creates new hope that science will ultimately find out a great deal about the creation of life on Earth,

REPORTS HOT UP

UFO reports are coming in at the rate of two a day at the time of going to press. Sightings in the Farnborough area of Hampshire, together with reports from all over Surrey are contributing to the biggest flap in the area since the spate of sightings around Basingstoke last year.

The *Daily Express*, (of Close Encounter serialisation fame) carried a centre spread in its 7 April issue. It linked sightings from Farnborough, Ash in Surrey and Ashdown Forest, implying that the same object had been seen travelling from west to east. Investigations were however soon to prove that this was not the case, and that sensationalism was to be the name of the game.

We first got to hear of these reports through member Alan Franklin, a journalist living at Alton. The first event was reported by a caretaker at Ash Walsh school, who telephoned the police after observing a multi-coloured object for over an hour. Constable Alan Craggs was called out after the caretaker had telephoned Mount Browne police HQ to report the object. Mount Browne claimed that they were unable to put him in contact with a UFO organisation, and so sent a constable to the scene. PC Craggs, with the caretaker, watched the object for about 20 minutes on (5 April in the evening). It changed colour "through the spectrum", moved erratically in the sky over Twesledown, Aldershot, travelling north.

At about the same time, a woman at Farnborough telephoned police to say that her young son had been frightened by an oval-shaped object which gave out golden flashes as it hovered over playing fields in the area. Towards the east, at a farm near Kingstanding in the Ashdown Forest area of Sussex, at about 22.30 hours again on 5 April, an object was reported as breaking in two as it fell from the sky. On impact, the object started a gorse fire, and appliances were sent to the area.

Of course this was just what the *Express* had been waiting for - an event to substantiate the publicity they had given to the subject a few weeks earlier. Under the banner "Close Encounter of the REAL Kind" the paper went mad. The impression was of a multi-coloured UFO which had swept in from the west, over Aldershot, past Guildford, and had finally crashed in flames in a Sussex forest. A picture showed police the following day searching the Ashdown Forest, armed with geiger counters in the event of radioactivity. Real science fiction stuff.

But what are the facts?

- * The Farnborough lady's son had run indoors from a local recreation field to say that he and two friends had seen a "large, cigar-shaped object" HOVERING over the playing fields. Time - 21.00 hours. It was not moving. She ran out to see lights flashing she could not explain.
- * The police at Guildford received a call from the Ash caretaker at 21.50 hours. The caretaker had already been observing the light for an hour and a half.
- * In Sussex, the flaming object hit the ground at 22.30 hours.

This period of observation, from about 20.20 hours at Ash, to 22.30 hours in the Ashdown Forest does not give the impression of a consistent trajectory.

The object also appears to have undertaken some remarkable shape changes.

At Farnborough it was "cigar-shaped"; by the time it reached Ashdown forest it was a flaming object; while in Ash, the caretaker and the policeman were looking at a stationary, or near-stationary object changing colour.

From the information that Sigap has (we have interviewed both the caretaker and the Farnborough woman), it would be illogical to assume that what was reported that night in three locations, was due to the same object. Our preliminary conclusions are that:

- * The son of the Farnborough woman did see something strange, something similar in appearance to the recent local reports of disc-shaped objects with a kind of fin. The flashes she observed may have been caused by an army flare, or by military exercises in the area which we understand were taking place that night. We also understand that some night flying from the Royal Aircraft Establishment was under way on that Wednesday evening.
- * The school caretaker and the policeman from Guildford were looking at the planet Jupiter, now at a magnitude of -1.7 in the constellation of Taurus. Atmospheric aberrations caused by moving dust particles and tiny crystals of ice high in the atmosphere can cause an observed distant source of light to appear to change colour. Observing the light source for more than a few minutes, particularly by using binoculars, would give the impression of erratic movement for two main reasons. First, the difficulty in establishing a suitable reference point (Jupiter's elevation above the horizon would have been about 40 degrees). And second, but not least, would be eye fatigue. By the time the constable arrived on the scene, the witness would be so convinced of movement and colour changes, his description (we suggest) would influence even a policeman's reasoning.
- * Both Bufora and the British UFO Documentation Centre have carried out investigations into the report from Sussex. At the time of going to press, Bufora's investigation results were not known, but both BUDC and the local police force were convinced that the cause of both the UFO and the fire was an army flare, possibly fired as part of a local exercise involving army cadets.

There are lessons to be learnt from this series of experiences.

- 1 Don't believe everything you read. National newspapers are fighting for survival, and they will do anything to increase circulation. Already this year, national dailies have lost 27,000,000 copies due to strikes.
- 2 Don't believe your eyes. What you think you are seeing is not necessarily the reality.
- 3 Policemen can get it wrong too.
- 4 Out of bad, comes good. The publicity given to these incidents have provoked a spate of reports which are still coming in. We have at least four further reports which tally with that of the Farnborough boy. These reports are being investigated.

It is possible that a large-scale military exercise was taking place on the Wednesday night. If so, it would account for much of the aerial activity, friendly or hostile! We are surprised that we were not contacted sooner by the police, and we shall be taking steps to ensure that communications between Sigap and the police are improved.

SKATEBOARD UFO

CASE s804

In issue 4 of *Sigap News* we reported that two boys at Basingstoke had heard a whirring noise and had seen a UFO on 30 January. A Case summary, by Omar Fowler follows:

On Monday 30 January 1978, at approximately 20.00 hours, two boys, one 13½ and the other 14, were playing on their skateboards on a quiet road in the Brighton Hill Estate area of Basingstoke, Hants. A few street lamps lit the scene and there were few people about.

The boys were playing with two others when they all happened to notice a bright light in the sky moving in their direction. One of the other boys commented that it was most likely an aeroplane, and at that stage, the other boys moved off leaving the two, Tony and David, by themselves.

The light had by now moved closer, and the two could begin to make out a round shape in the middle of the glowing orangy-yellow light. As it approached, the whole glowing light seemed to be spinning. It continued to come closer and began to hover. Only a series of lights around the centre of the body continued to rotate.

The boys gave the following details:

- * The object approached to about 100 feet from the ground.
- * It was oval in shape
- *** It had a row of yellow lights rotating around the centre (subsequently estimated at 80 revolutions per minute).
- * As the lights spun, a small green light could be seen at each revolution.

The yellow lights were clear in outline on the leading section, but were blurred on the trailing part of the light, that is, half round in front and blurred at the back. The green light could be seen in the line of yellow lights, appearing regularly.

Other lights could also be seen, and a red dome was situated on top of the body. Behind that, a red light seemed to be suspended just above the body, as though on some kind of aerial, although no details of aerials could be seen. A white light was positioned on the forward part of the body, and a rhythmic doning noise, like that of bees, was heard.

The object was seen to reverse a little, then came forward again and continued to hover. Tony and David described the object as being the length of a house roof. By this time they were scared and began to run for home. One of the boys dropped his skateboard, but quickly retrieved it and ran on. After a short time, they stopped and glanced back - but the object had gone.

They ran home, scared and shaken, to tell their parents.

The discussion broadened later to encompass the 'Establishment view', Russian attitudes to UFOs, the influence of the CIA (particularly the Robertson panel report, and of course, the Condon Report.

We hope that Charles enjoyed his visit as much as we did, and we look forward to seeing him again in the not too distant future.

A FIRST WORLD WAR PHENOMENON

An extract from: Air Observation - Warplanes of World War 1

The behaviour of the engine went from bad to worse, and the vibration became more and more intense. Once more, I thought it would peter out before we were within gliding distance of British territory, and I therefore made ready to burn the machine - the last duty of an airman let in for the catastrophe of a landing among enemies. But the engine kept alive, obstinately and unevenly. 'V' held down the nose of the machine still farther, so as to gain the lines in the quickest possible time.

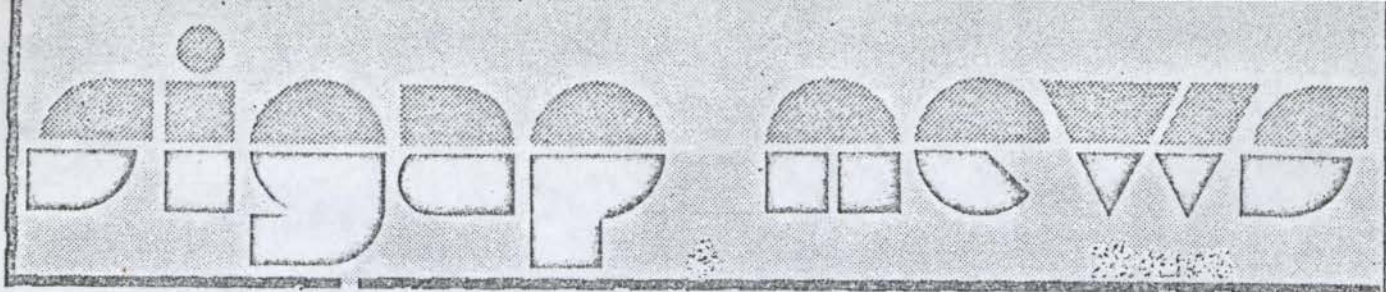
Soon we were treated to a display by the family ghost of the clan of Archibald, otherwise an immense pillar of grey-white smoky substance that appeared very suddenly to the windward of us. It stretched up vertically from the ground to a height about level with ours, which was then only 5500 feet. We watched it curiously as it stood in an unbending rigidity similar to that of a giant waxwork, cold, unnatural, stupidly implacable, half unbelievable and wholly ridiculous. At the top it sprayed round, like a stick of asparagus. For two or three months, similar apparitions had been exhibited to us at rare intervals, nearly always in the same neighbourhood.

At first sight the pillars of smoke seemed not to disperse, but after an interval, they apparently faded away as mysteriously as they had appeared. What was meant to be their particular branch of frightfulness I cannot say. One rumour was that they were an experiment in aerial gassing, and another that they were of some phosphorous compound. All I know is that they entertained us from time to time, with no apparent damage.

EDITORIAL

WALKING THE TIGHTROPE

Since its formation 12 years ago, Sigap has always maintained the role of an independent investigation group. This decision was not made as the result of trying to act as a 'secret society', but because in our opinion, larger organisations have failed to act in what we consider to be a scientific manner.

The big question has always been: After the investigation of a UFO incident has been completed and the report fully written up in every detail, what then? Should it be passed onto a larger organisation, which may not even have the resources that are available to ourselves? It is more likely to be filed away to gather dust in some corner. Would it not be wiser to make it available to the world at large or to a scientific body? The aim of our group has always been to investigate the UFO event fully and then to pass on the report for further study.

In recent months, members of our group have had the opportunity to listen to the executives of other larger UFO investigation organisations. In most cases the story is the same - what to do with the UFO reports. Unfortunately, it is often the case that the investigation of UFOs' takes second place to the power struggles which have been a regular feature of the larger groups. This has bred conflict, and inter-group rivalry has drained the life blood from some of the larger organisations, an event that we have watched with deep regret.

However, life must go on, and although we too have had our ups and downs, any differences have been quickly settled and the search for the answer to the UFO mystery goes on.

So, what do we do with the UFO reports? We believe that our present course is correct and that by passing reports to the Center for UFO Studies which is run by Dr J Allan Hynek and to *Flying Saucer Review* for publication, we have done our best to make our reports available for scientific study.

We have for many years co-operated with other groups and often pass on interesting cases for comparison and information, and we shall continue to do so. However, we believe that the particular 'tightrope' that we have chosen is the right one.

NAVY TRACKS UFOS NEAR OCALA

OCALA (AP) Unexplained lighted objects in the night sky over a remote sector of Florida forest were sighted and tracked on radar at a Navy electronic warfare centre, naval personnel have confirmed.

They say one object hovered in midair, then sped away after eluding computerised tracking gear with a hairpin turn.

"The computer wouldn't handle it," said Lt Commander John Sullivan, base commander of the Navy's Pinecastle Electronic Warfare Range in the Ocala National Forest of North-Central Florida.

Sullivan was not involved in the series of reported sightings that took place over a two-hour period Sunday night. But he permitted detailed interviews of three base personnel by the 'Ocala Star Banner' on Monday.

One was SK-1 Robert J Clark of Detroit, duty officer Sunday night when a civilian called at 10.05 pm to ask if the base was using any flares.

Pinecastle uses sophisticated electronic equipment to train pilots to evade enemy weapons in combat.

"I told her there were no flares in the area, and that the range wasn't operating at the time," Clark said.

The phone rang again, Clark said, and a man who wouldn't give his name reported that he and seven others travelling on route SR 19 near Silver Glen Springs had also seen something strange.

The man described the sighting as an object 50 or 60 feet in diameter with flashing lights, Clark said. The caller said it flew right over the top of the vehicle he was driving, close enough to get a good look before it disappeared.

Clark logged the second call and contacted the Naval Air station at Jacksonville for details on all known aircraft currently over Pinecastle area. Jacksonville reported no known aircraft currently over Pinecastle area.

"So we got out the binoculars and went up on the tower," Clark said. "We located an object due north, approximately 1500 feet above the trees. We watched it for 15 or 20 minutes and it looked like it was pretty stationary".

Mr Timothy Collins of Cambridge, Mass, a navy radar technician for eight years was manning the radarscope. "I've never seen anything like it and I don't want to see anything like it again," Collins said. "First it was heading south and then it was heading north. All in the split of a second... planes just don't have a turning radius like that."

('Today', Wednesday May 17 1978)

Here we have a most interesting report. Seen both visually and on radar, the sighting was reported on the front page of Florida's most important daily, serving as it does, the Cape Canaveral area. The report is similar to hundreds which have found their way into the files of UFO investigators.

But there are two significant points about this report. First, it has been treated as a serious news item by the paper, and does not carry the sly and clever innuendoes so often seen in British newspapers. UFOs are taken seriously in the States, and the media appears to treat them as such. Second, and perhaps more importantly, the case, had it occurred in Britain would NEVER have seen the light of day. In the first place the MOD would just not have released ANY information about such a report. If the story

had leaked out to the press, the Government would have slapped a 'D' notice on the information. And press interviews with military witnesses would invoke howls of laughter from Defence Press Offices. "We have nothing to say", would be the only statement.

UFOs are just one example of the restrictions in our freedom we face in this country. The Official Secrets Act, brought in during the First World War to stop soldiers from talking about the true position, is now used to gag millions of employees, from the Ministry of Agriculture to the Post Office.

It is often said that the UK has less spectacular sightings than the US or France. In reality, the only difference is that witnesses in the US or France can be supported by official evidence. British UFO witnesses do not have the basic freedom to ask for support, and requests are often met with derision by the authorities. It is not surprising that the media treat the subject as a joke, when they get nowhere with those who hold the key to the evidence.

The sooner this country gets a Freedom of Information Act, the sooner we shall solve the mystery of the UFOs.

AN UNUSUAL INCIDENT AT CHURT

CASE S817

6 APRIL 1978 - THURSDAY EVENING - At about 2100, two local girls, one 13½ and the other 14, were walking down a road in Churt, near Farnham, when they both saw an oval-shaped object in the sky. It had green, red and white flashing lights, and was hovering over some nearby trees. After about five minutes, both girls ran back to the home of one of them, and told her parents.

Before long, they returned for another peep. The object, they estimated, had been hovering only about 400 yards from the house, which is situated in wooded country. By now, it had moved further away, and could be seen lower through the trees, glowing and completely silent.

This time, before running away again, they were able to study the object in more detail. It was silvery and glowing, and the green lights were flashing faster than the other (red and white). Both girls described "windows" around the top of the "saucer" as appearing like "flies eyes", that kind of insect-like structure. (See sketch overleaf). The girls did not see the object move away as they ran back to the house a second time.

Later, both girls described the object as shimmering, similar to light shining on silver, and they also mentioned that the green lights were flashing faster than the others. The windows were unusual in having the "insect - eye" features, which is something we have not come across before. The incident occurred during the April 'flap', but no other witnesses have yet been traced.

Note: The light features were as follows: Red, top right. White, top left. Green, bottom.

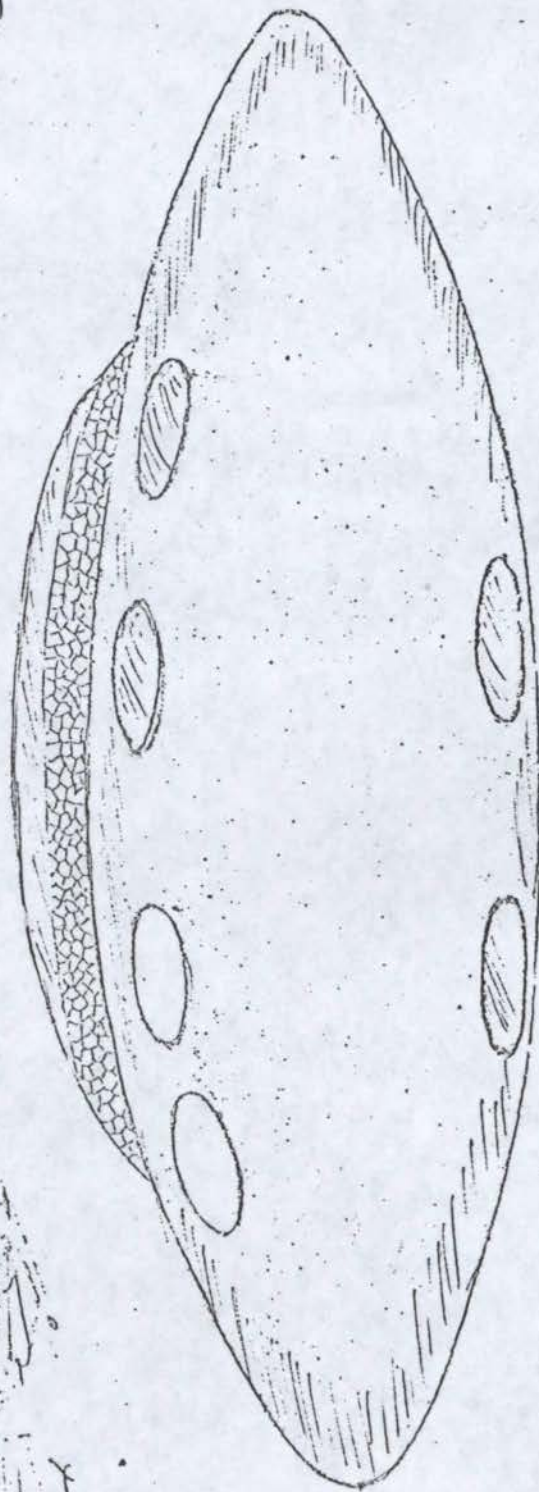

REPORT OF THE LAST MEETING (17 MAY)

GUEST SPEAKER - KEN ROGERS, Chairman British UFO Society.

Report by ANN DENT

Two vivid lights in the night sky seen by Mr Robert Stevens, of Tongham, sent him rushing for powerful binoculars. This is just one of the Surrey UFO sightings being investigated by the Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena.

A first-hand account of the engineless and silent object was given by Mr Stevens (32) to a meeting of the group.

Mr Stevens said that on May 9 at 2155hrs he spotted the two lights in the direction of the Hog's Back. Being a keen aircraft spotter, he thought at first it was a low-flying plane and dashed for his binoculars.

He rushed out of his house in Grieve Road on The Laurels estate and caught a different view. He explained: 'As it turned I saw it was cigar shaped with two lights at the front and two at the back and a red static light in the middle.'

He watched the UFO for four minutes before reporting it to the Royal Aircraft Establishment at Farnborough and to Mr Omar Fowler, of the Surrey Investigation Group. It was seen also by Mr Stevens' wife, Janette.

An account of another recent local sighting came from Peter Inwood (50), caretaker of Walsh Middle School, Ash. He told of a bright white light that changed colour to red and blue. It was seen also by Mr Inwood's wife, Barbara, daughters, Jacqueline and Christine and PC Alan Craggs, of Ash Police.

Mr Ken Rogers, chairman of the British UFO Society, guest speaker at the meeting, gave a list of reported sightings on April 5, the same day as Mr Inwood's.

These came from Kent, Sussex, Oxfordshire, Farnborough, Chilworth, Farnham, Staffordshire and Lancashire. He felt that all sightings were worthy of scientific investigation but felt there were too many amateur associations trying to tackle them.

Mr Rogers said: 'I envisage one national body divided perhaps into counties and regions with evaluation panels' He would like to see all sighting reports sent to one central source and the publication of one periodical on sale to the public. He felt there was a great deal of interest in aerial phenomena but that all organisations should be linked.

Mr Richard Beet, a member of the Surrey Investigation Group, felt it would be impossible to get people to report sightings to one centre. 'People have different theories so there are always differences of opinion. The trouble is we do not know what we are investigating.'

Mr Rogers said this was because ufology was followed only as a hobby but Mr Beet answered: 'Science is advanced by the interest of amateurs.' Mr Inwood said he had no idea who to contact, he did not know what organisations existed and would like there to have been a central phone number.

Mr Rogers felt ufology was amateurish and underfinanced. 'Its groups are like secret societies - too many societies collecting too many reports and where are they going?' he questioned, 'I do not wish to be disillusionary, but they only go into filing cabinets.'

He said that if the UFO subject was going to be solved it could only be by working efficiently both locally and nationally together.

'People want information.' Mr Rogers said. 'If they are bold they ring the police or a newspaper so it seems the only source of publicising sightings is the press.'

'From the point of view of investigation societies this meant a time lag and a cold trail. If there was a central number then members could be alerted and get out on hillside watching, Royal Air Force bases and airports could be asked if there is a normal explanation and so we would be on top of the situation.' he said.

Mr Rogers felt that if ufology was given a government grant, it could be properly organised. 'At present the Ministry of Defence is only interested from the point of view of security.'

But the Surrey members did not favour his suggestion and Mr Beet said: 'The trouble with commercialisation is that concentration would go to the more spectacular aspects and we would lose our scientist members.'

The chairman of the Surrey group, Mr Omar Fowler, said there had been 32 substantial reports in the county during the year and of those, 11 were close encounters in which people were able to give details of shape and size.

CIGAR SHAPED OBJECT TRACKED ACROSS SOUTHERN ENGLAND

TUESDAY NIGHT - 9 MAY 1978 - CASE S832

An unusual cigar-shaped object was reported travelling quite slowly across Kent, Sussex, Surrey and was last seen flying across North Hampshire.

The first report was received from a newspaper journalist, who first saw the object at 2105hrs from Lamberhurst (Kent) and described it as a bright white light in the distance. Fifteen minutes later, the journalist, who was driving home, passed through Hurst Green, where he again stopped his car and watched the object as it passed overhead which he estimated as 2,000 feet.

The object could now be seen more clearly, and apart from the white light, a red light was also visible. The lights did not blink and there was no sound. The craft was last seen flying in the direction of Ticehurst. He rang up Gatwick Air Traffic Control, but they could not explain the sighting.

Thirty five minutes later, and a further fifty miles away (it was by now 2155hrs) at Tongham, near Aldershot Hants, a 32 year old man was sitting at home watching television, when he noticed two bright lights, side by side, approaching from the direction of the 'Hogs Back' (a part of the North Downs). Based on this second report, the flying 'cigar' had been travelling at about 85 miles per hour. If it had proceeded in a straight line across the country on a bearing of 280 degrees, it would have passed over East Grinstead, Gatwick Airport and Godalming, in Surrey.

This second witness had been a keen aircraft spotter for many years and because of this, took a keen interest in the flying object approaching his house. He ran upstairs to get a 'fix' on the object with his binoculars, but what he saw shocked him - the craft had no wings, it had a body about the size of a BAC 111 jetliner, a red light on the top and two bright lights on the front and rear similar to car headlights. The lights at the rear were evident when the craft turned while passing overhead. It changed direction slightly and headed off in a straight line just south of Aldershot (heading NNE).

The object was completely silent and was flying at an estimated altitude of 1,000ft. The flying cigar was also seen by his wife and was viewed for about four minutes before finally moving out of sight into the distance.

The witness, an experienced observer, viewing the object with binoculars, described it as oblong and having a sharply-defined shape. We accept the report as fully substantiated and one which cannot be explained by conventional standards.

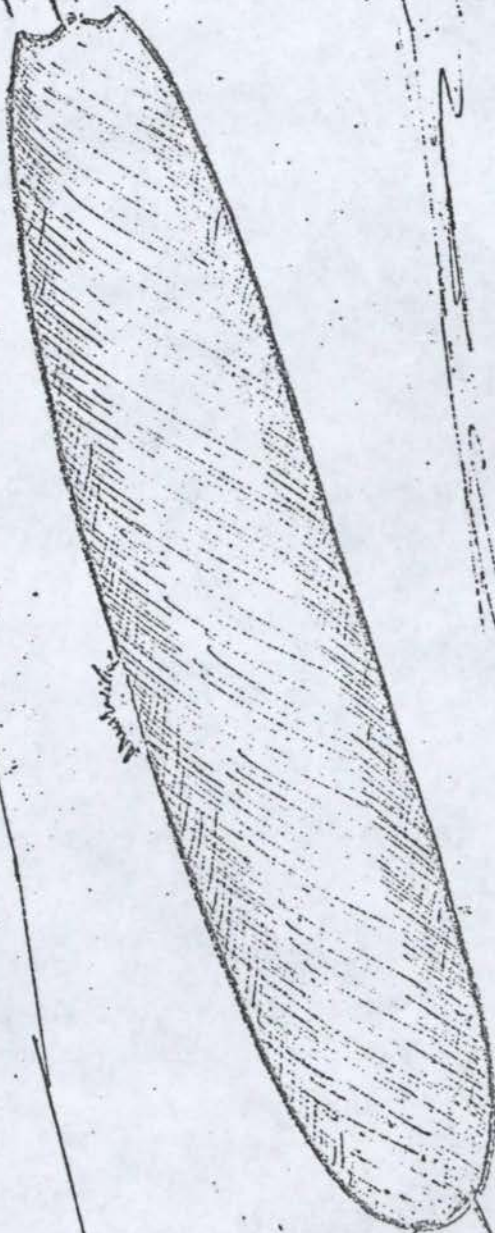

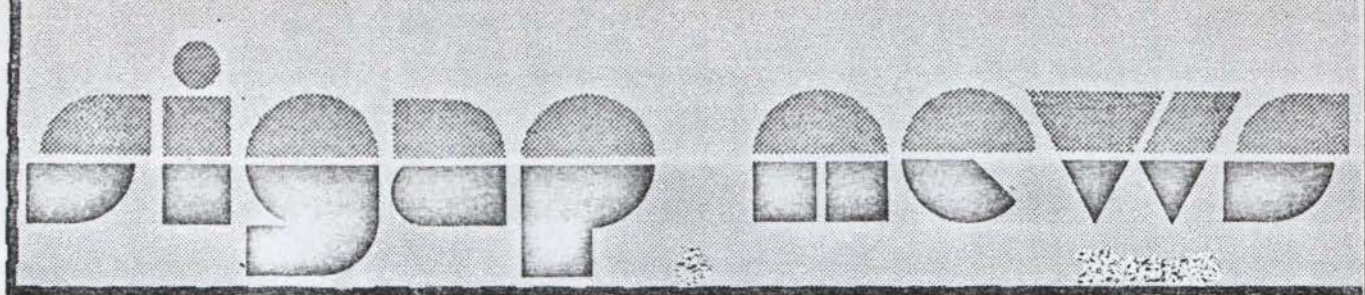

A 1937 UFO IN SURREY

About September or October 1937 at about 4pm in the afternoon, my wife and I were motoring back to Haslemere where I then lived. We were returning from a visit to my sister who lived in Sussex.

On turning onto the main Haslemere road near Northchapel, I turned into a side road and suddenly pulled up as I saw a mysterious object. It was over on my left, at the brow of Blackdown Hill.

On the summit, I noticed this unusual object hovering, it was like a flaming orange circle with a lump in the middle, the whole thing was surrounded by orange flame.

I was watching this curious object when I noticed that another car had also pulled up behind me. The object obviously noticed the cars in this isolated place, then suddenly flew back along the edge of Blackdown Hill out of sight. I waited some few minutes and then noticed that the same object had re-appeared again some distance along the ridge than previously.

I presumed that in this very lovely and isolated spot, the occupant had been surprised to find a car below and on the appearance of the second car it retired back along the ridge. I watched from below as it disappeared at a terrific speed.

I sat there and began to wonder what it could have been and as Farnborough (the experimental aircraft establishment) was only a few miles away, I imagined that it was a new special aircraft of some kind being tested out.

At that time (1937) I may add that many peoples minds were on a possible war and therefore I decided not to say anything.....

N.B. Major Turner-Bridger had previously served in Kings Own Scottish , Borderers in the trenches in the First World War, before being wounded and transferring to the Royal Flying Corps in 1916.

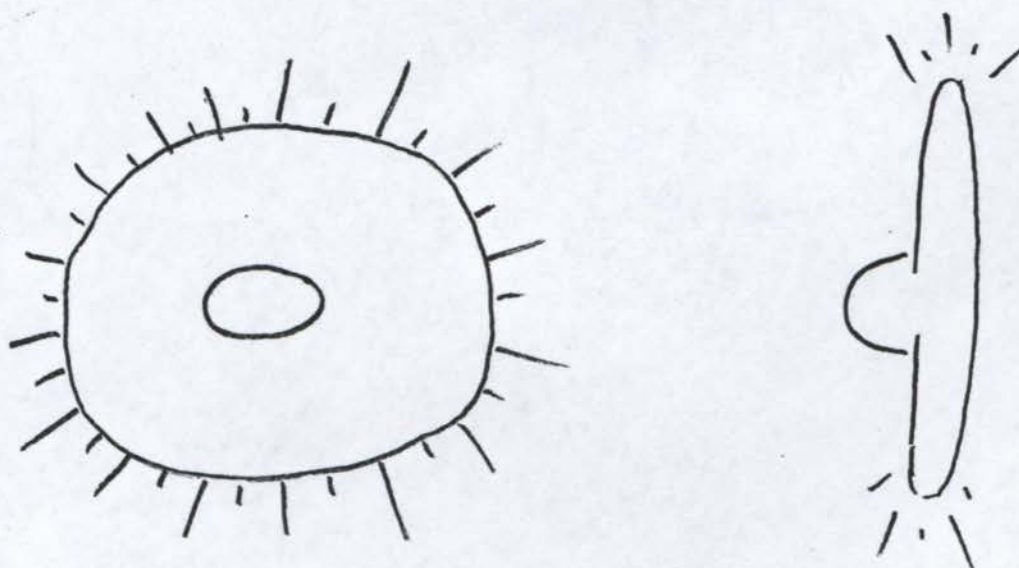
It seems unlikely that even if the object had been reported to the R.A.F., that any action would, or could have been taken to investigate the incident.

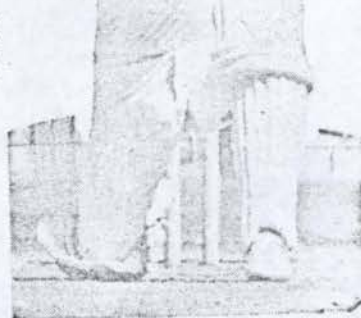


YOUNG West Australian

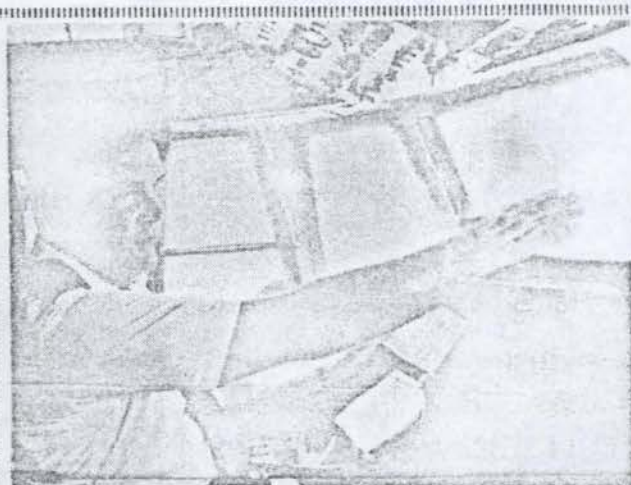

AIR FORCE PUT ON UFO ALERT

A STRIKE squadron of the New
Zealand Air Force was on stand
by for a possible UFO sighting over the country.

One or two of the country's
Skyhawk fighter-bombers would be
sent up if radar at Wellington airport
picked up positive "bleeps," a defence
official said.

The move follows several
sightings of UFOs by
planes and ground radar
from near the Kalkoura
mountains on the north-
ern tip of the South
Island in the past few
days.

One unidentified object
filmed by a TV news
crew flying from Wellin-
gton to Christchurch early
on Sunday morning New
Zealand time was shown
on Channel 0 in Mel-
bourne last night (See
Page 2).

It was filmed by free-
lance cameraman David
Crockett, who was com-
missioned by Channel 0
reporter Quentin Fogarty.

Fogarty, 32, had arrang-
ed to fly in a four-engine
turbo-prop Argosy freight-
er, carrying Sunday
newspapers on a similar
run to one on which
people reported seeing
UFOs on the night of
December 20-21.

On that earlier flight
Captain Vern Powell, who
has been flying for 26
years, reported seeing
white objects with a red
tinge moving at tremen-
dous speed.

On the ground, Well-
ington airport radar
picked up five "very
strong radar targets" in
an area where nothing
should have been.

Quentin Fogarty said
yesterday that on Sunday
morning's flight, he was
about to go "on camera"
to say there was nothing
happening when the Ar-
gosy skipper, Capt. Bill
Startup called to the film
crew to come up on the
flight deck to see UFOs.

Capt. Startup told The
Sun by phone from New
Zealand yesterday: "We
spotted lights which were

confirmed by ground ra-
dar in Wellington.

"Air traffic control
then told us there was an
object about one mile be-
hind us, and I turned the
plane around to have a
look.

"We spotted something
which kept accelerating
to get close to us and
would then fall back. I
know of no plane which
could carry out such a
manoeuvre.

"We made a two-min-
ute orbit, then continued
the run because we did
not want to push our
luck," said Captain Start-
up, a pilot for 23 years.

Wife was scared

At Christchurch, the
cameraman's wife, Mrs.
Naire Crockett, who ac-
companies her husband
on assignments, left the
flight because she was
"frightened," her husband
told The Sun last night.

Local New Zealand TV
reporter Mr. Dennis
Grant then joined the
others for the return trip.

Capt. Startup said: "As
we were climbing out of
Christchurch at 2000 feet,
I spotted a light travel-
ling parallel to us.

"We turned 90 degrees
and got within 10 miles
of it. It overtook us,
stayed above us, came in
front and then shot
away."

Mr. Crockett said: "At
one time there was an
object travelling about a
mile behind us. Later
there were three trailing
us. It got a bit scary."



Are UFO's Flaming "Coronas" ?

I was informed of an "OVNI" sighting which was supposed to have occurred about 7.30pm on the evening of Sunday 3rd December 78.

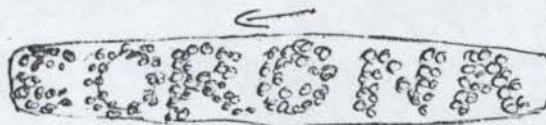
An engineer with Fermitex saw a wing shaped object which had approached to within "5 blocks" and had incandescent lights or flames upon or under it. I have since met the witness and he is willing to fill out a form, questionnaire, provided he can do so in Spanish. (SIGAP will supply these) .

I have since witnessed myself, a very strange spectacle which may account for the sighting.

An aircraft carrying an advertisement for "Corona" flew over me the other evening. The sign is illuminated by small bulbs on the underside of the wing and the lighting sequence moves from right to left. It is very effective when seen flying overhead, however when seen at an angle of 45° or less the words cannot be seen and only a rippling light effect is visible. The polluted atmosphere could have accounted for the orange effect, it is certainly one of the most spectacular man made "UFO's" I have seen.

The papers have recently carried headlines saying "The OVNI'S (UFO's) ARE BACK", but so far I have been unable to obtain a copy. However I did read recently in the "NEWS" an English language paper, that information has just been released of a landing in Spain 18 years ago and the occupants were captured. The details were to have been released at the forthcoming IBERIAN UFO CONFERENCE, I will try and get more details.

Richards sketch showing details of the lights.

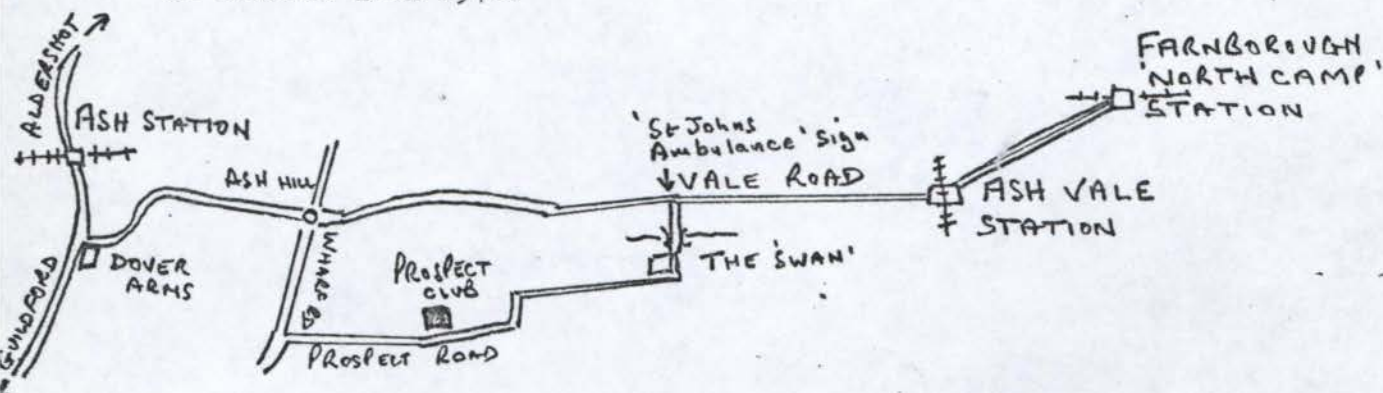
1978 UFO LIST

ITALIAN INCIDENTS

September 1978

15.9.78

Province of Versilia.

An illuminated object was seen over Versia on 14/9/78. The object stopped twice in the air and when it stopped, the light vanished.

It is the second time this summer that objects have been seen in Versilia.

The object was first seen at 6am when miners from the marble quarries were changing shifts. There were four witnesses who described the UFO as having a bright blinding light and flying at "Aeroplane height". The object was seen flying towards Pisa & Bologna.

It was illuminated only when moving. When it stood still for about a minute it was not lit up , but then started to light up again and flew off.

The object was also reported from many other provinces : Grosseto, Lucca, Arezzo, Carrara, La Spezia and Valdivara.

It was described as being light in colour, cigar shaped and leaving a bluish red trail. It also emitted bright rays, moved up and down and then flew off.

In the province of Valdivara three fishermen were frightened when they saw the UFO send out a gree/bluish light towards the ground.

ROME: Object described as looking like a rugby ball, moving silently with a blinding light. A luminous ring came off the object and it moved away faster and out of sight.

Editors Note (La Nazione) Usually we do not take such notice of these reports, but so many people have seen them , they cannot be ignored. They have been seen by many people who can be trusted.

2nd January 1979

A report from Mr J.Hodge of RIPLEY, Surrey.

I was awakened by a low flying aircraft about 7.15am. I saw a flashing light outside my bedroom window and got up to see what it was.

There in the distance I saw an aircraft flying away, with its lights flashing. I thought he is flying really low.

My attention was then attracted by a dull grey light higher in the sky. I thought that it could not have been a star, because the light became brighter and a round disc shape began to appear.

I grabbed my binoculars to get a better look and ran outside onto my drive, the thing was still there, but the light had faded as a cloud drifted across.

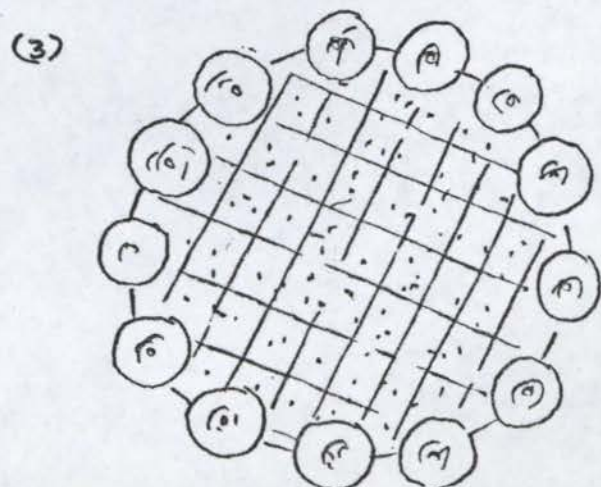
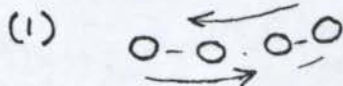
I waited for the cloud to pass so that I could get a better look, it was near freezing, but it was worth it because the cloud passed and I could see that the UFO now became brighter and it seemed to be coming towards me. Then it seemed to go away from me again and moved from side to side in a rocking motion. (1)

More cloud passed and then I could see it really clear, a silvery light, very bright, a little bluish. (2)

Then it appeared to turn on its side and was no longer oval, but now a complete circle, but around the edge of the circle I could see discs. (3) They seemed to be pulsating with a silver bluish light coming from them. Then I could see across the complete underside of the thing, bands, like broad bands of webbing, but it was pitted with studs or dots which were shiny.

I knew then it was a UFO and I ran off to a phone box to dial 999.

It was then that the object resumed its original position and flew off.

On the night of October 20th 1978, between 2305 and 2320 a strange rhythmic noise was heard over ALDERSHOT, Hants.

Previously this same noise had been heard in the area of North Lane & Tongham. In one instance a witness heard the noise above the running of the car engine and by lowering his window and driving around the area, was able to locate it in the area of North Lane.

In this instance the droning was loud enough to be heard above the noise of traffic and was so loud that it attracted Mr Osbiston an 18 year old student living in Cargate Avenue, Aldershot.

Stephen Osbiston was able to record the noise from his bedroom window and the recording was used in a local radio programme "Radio 210" in its feature programme "60 minutes".

This incident was the climax to weeks of reports of strange droning noises and mystery lights in the sky, flooding in from the Aldershot and Farnborough area.

Subsequently the tape recording was passed to the R.A.E. Farnborough for analysis. The findings are given below:-

The tape recording waveforms, which are sinusoidal, have been studied on an oscilloscope and appears to be (the oscillating part only) a variation of frequency between 915Hz and 1kHz with a regular sweep rate of 0.23 sec.

The oscillation was also simulated using a Frequency Sweep Generator which produced almost an exact copy.

On detail listening there seems to be two possibilities:

(a) The noise is almost exactly the same as the sound made by a British Rail "Mainliner" track ballast and rail aligner, with the slow reciprocating sound of a diesel engine with the sound of gravel/ballast being sifted and scraping of the metal to metal contact of flanged wheels travelling slowly along a railway line.

There are also sounds of what appears to be a normal diesel locomotive on the early part of the tape.

(b) There is the possibility that the oscillating part could also be some type of experimental siren, but that does not fit precisely.

The tape will be played for everyone to hear, at the next SIGAP meeting, detailed earlier in this issue.
